It was soon after I carried the banner from Parish Hall to the Sanctuary that I received this wonderful article from Bishop David Bard. Immediately I knew that I needed to not only share it with you, but I also needed to give the banner a new name. During Advent you had filled *Hope, Peace, Love and Joy* with your prayers, loving conversations during coffee every Sunday, and thoughts from Pastor Rob's Advent series, "Journeys". As I lifted that banner high above the altar, I looked at the stained-glass window as that one "special" piece of glass shone extra bright and I said out loud... "Hope begins when you stand in the dark looking up at the light". This banner will now carry the name: Windows of Hope. It is my prayer that as you read Bishop Bard's wonderful article and look at this banner every Sunday, you will contemplate how we as a church can Make All Things New by being the Windows of Hope. May we each embrace God's

gift of love. And may we treat ourselves and others with kindness, compassion, and understanding as we embark on the new year *together*. Bishop Bard said it best: *it is a time to reaffirm that the God of Jesus Christ is a God who is at work in our lives and in the world making all things new.* Thoughtfully read Bishop Bard's words... *Juanita Joiner* 

"Looking back over last year, I'll admit it was difficult and challenging in many ways. War dragged on in Ukraine. The brutal Hamas attack on Israel on October 7, involving rape, killing, and kidnapping, led to a massive Israeli response that has taken thousands of Palestinian lives and created a humanitarian crisis in Gaza. Gun violence continues to exact a terrible toll in this country, and as the year ended, we witnessed a horrific act of gun violence in Prague. There is a humanitarian crisis at our southern border. In our conference, dealing with disaffiliation and declining budgets took significant time, attention, and energy.

Of course, there were also moments of beauty, kindness, tenderness, grace, and love to note from the past year. I delight in the stories of ministries going well despite the challenges of our day and time and testimonies of churches reaching out in love and service in the name of Jesus Christ.

And now we stand at the beginning of a new year. While the simple turning of a calendar page does not mean we leave all the difficulties and challenges of the past year behind, it does offer an opportunity to focus forward and **to reaffirm that the God of Jesus Christ is a God who is at work in our lives and in the world making all things new.** "Do not remember the former things, or consider the things of old, I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert" (Isaiah 43:18-19 NRSVUE). "And the one who was seated on the throne said, 'See, I am making all things new'" (Revelation 21:5a). "So, if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!" (2 Corinthians 5:17).

Of course, God's making things new does not simply erase the past and does not end grief, pain, sorrow, or war in the blink of an eye. We carry the past with us. The old year travels into the new one. In the well-known words of the novelist William Faulkner from *Requiem for a Nun:* "The past is never dead. It's not even past." Yet we affirm that God is working to make all things new. God is always doing a new thing – in our lives and in our world. God is always at work, moving toward love and justice, beauty and kindness, peace, and reconciliation. And even when things may be outwardly familiar in many ways, God is working on renewal. I think of the words of the poet T.S. Eliot in "Little Gidding": "With the drawing of this Love and the voice of this Calling / We shall not cease from exploration / And the end of all our exploring / Will be to arrive where we started / And know the place for the first time."

As we enter this new year, let's ask how God may work among us and through us to make the world anew. Where might God be inviting us to do new things in the furtherance of justice, kindness, peace, and reconciliation? How might we be more attentive to how God is making each of us new, renewing us in love and gentleness? In what new ways may God be inviting and empowering us to share the good news of the gospel with a world in need of God's love in Jesus Christ? While we carry the past with us, we need not be imprisoned by it. The turning of a new year is a good time to focus forward."

# FAIRFIELD CHILDREN'S HOME — The Homes of Hope



Pastor Rob will be spending part of his sabbatical in Zimbabwe visiting Africa University and the Fairfield Children's Home. He has invited us to join him on that visit. Our donation from CUMC for the Fairfield Children's Home will make that long journey to Africa and

will be presented as our gift of love. Jars are set out each Sunday for you to drop in your pocket change. These jars will be out till he leaves after Easter.

**Old Mutare Mission** is located on the edge of the glorious and towering Chiremba Mountain. The Mission was established by Bishop Joseph C. Hartzell and houses Hartzell Primary School, Hartzell High School, Old Mutare Hospital and Fairfield's Orphanage. In a vision on top of Mt. Ciremba, Bishop Hartzell heard voices from all nations coming to the mission and the vision was fulfilled almost a hundred years later with the establishment of Africa University. Africa University is the first university in Zimbabwe that has special curriculum for international students. It is located right next to the Mission.

Since 1996, Fairfield Outreach and Sponsors Association has been providing for the needs of orphaned children in the area surrounding the Old Mutare Mission in southeastern Zimbabwe. FOSA was founded from the passion of young college students and developed with the help of many devoted supporters.

In 2002, the founders of FOSA and a missionary volunteer began planning and fundraising to build what would become Fairfield Children's Homes. The missionary traveled to Old Mutare to begin the long process of organizing the building of the Homes. This missionary worked tirelessly to see that the *Homes of Hope* were built. The foundation was dug for the first, but soon after plans were made for seven more. But the needs only continued. In all, twelve homes were built. It's now been 20 years since the children moved into their "new homes".

Central, you understand the word HOPE. You understand the meaning of LOVE.

You also understand giving to MISSIONS! What a perfect way to send CUMC's love and prayers of hope to these special African children. Every child deserves a family of their own. These family-inspired homes allow every child to be raised with the support of a family unit in the comfort of a home.


