LOVE ONE ANOTHER...AS GOD LOVES US

When I was a child, I LOVED to read stories that started this way ... Once Upon a Time! I decided to start this month's editorial out with those exact words. Sit back and relax, pour a cup of coffee and read this heartwarming story.

Once Upon a Time during the early 1960's, there were two ladies who loved to write. Gladys lived in Springwood, Australia on a farm with her husband and they raised sheep; Martha and her husband lived in Central Illinois where they were teaching. Both ladies were born in 1927 but never knew each other until Martha decided to find a pen pal. Little did these ladies, now in their 30's, ever think this would end up being a life-long friendship, but it did. And their friendship also remains

in the minds and hearts of their children.

By now you have probably guessed that the Martha in this story is our very own Martha Giacobassi. The Martha that turned 96 on August 27. The Martha that has blessed so many of us with her lovely handwritten notes. Now back to the story because it's not over yet.

After I put a request for yarn in a past Outlook for Mary and Blake Duram to use for the hats they make for the school children, I was gifted two bags of yarn from Martha. The first bag contained perfect yarn for these hats, but when I opened the next bag, my jaw dropped and my hands touched a note written in Martha's beautiful penmanship. The note said this: **Yarn from Gladys in Australia and spun by Martha.** I immediately called Martha and asked for the story...and a story she shared. After that first call, I told her I would make her something special with her yarn and it too would tell a story. Martha responded by saying...Oh I wish Gladys was still alive so I could share this with her. (No, I didn't give this yarn to Mary and Blake; I think they will also be touched by what I did with that yarn.)

Gladys raised sheep and when you have sheep you need to shear them at least once a year, sometimes even more. The wool is then washed, carded and made into roving. The roving is then spun into yarn. Gladys had gifted Martha with lots of roving from her sheep. Martha told me she taught herself to spin using a spinning wheel she purchased just for that project. This yarn was rustic yarn...some of it was what we call in the knitting world, wooly wool and sometimes referred to as sticky yarn...other yarn was soft and gentle. In all, she had included yarn from seven different breeds of sheep...all the enclosed yarn was different colors...different textures.

I decided to find a pattern that would retell that friendship that grew as they aged and went through each stage of life as mothers, grandmothers, great-grandmothers and yes, even widows. A shawl seemed fitting because a shawl will warm your shoulders and actually can feel like a hug. I can only imagine their last visit and that parting hug...I bet each lady couldn't wait to put pen to paper and record those memories. These two ladies actually traveled to opposite hemispheres to connect in person. Even after these visits, letters (and I mean long letters) continued. They continued writing until the June of 1998 when Gladys's daughter wrote Martha to tell her of her passing. This would end their 38+ years of friendship, of visits and those dearly loved letters.

Martha's shawl tells a story of two ladies living in different hemispheres by the two visible sides to the shawl; the passing of time by the change in the color and texture of wool; the friendship that only grew over the years by the increase in size and shape; the beginning and ending that is a repeat of the same color of yarn showing that Martha and Gladys *together* built this touching story...a story that will have no ending because like I said, Gladys planted memories in Martha's children and Martha planted memories in the children of Gladys.

There is a lesson to learn from these ladies...a lesson for our church. Pastor Rob said it beautifully in his closing remarks on August 20th. After all these years, we have learned to love others as God loves us. That's our purpose as God's people. That's our future as a church. We are going to go on loving one another, and we are going to love the people God calls us to love, with no expectations. We are going to love the people beyond these church walls, even if they don't join us here. We are going to love them where they are, and how we find them, because that's how God loves us. So, let's do what we do best as a church. Let's go on loving one another, with no expectations. Let's love one another in the same way God loves us...Amen.



May these words guide us as we face our Horizon, Mountains, Road and even our Road Sign. (See page 2)


