Weeds are relentless...at least they were for me this year. No matter how hard I worked pulling them up by the roots, the weeds just didn't stop growing back. I began

to dislike weeds when I was a child living in a house with a huge yard and tons of gardens. My Dad loved to keep his daughters busy outside not playing but working. We had to earn that \$.25 weekly allowance after all!

There's something about weeds. They always grow back. But if we pulled petunias, zinnias, or even lettuce, they never return unless we plant them again. Just think...weeds have been around forever! Even back in the time of Jesus, people were frustrated by weeds. Both the *plant-type* weeds that trouble the gardens but also the *human-type* weeds that trouble us on a deeper and more complex level.

Our world is overflowing with human-type weeds. We have both good and bad growing together all around us in our neighborhoods, our places of work, in our society and even in our government...things that are both constructive and destructive. If we think about it, these things have always existed together and have always shared the same soil. Like plants and weeds that draw nourishment from the same soil, they have become completely intertwined at their roots. Sometimes I have found that they aren't clearly distinguishable.

This is bad gardening advice...don't bother pulling the weeds. Let both our plantings (things we are excited about in life) and our weeds (those things we need to care about in life) grow together. Co-exist. I think we can liken weeds to people we need to help, people we need to open our church doors to, people who need some help finding a place to sleep and food for their table, people who need to know the world isn't against them or not caring. All the pulling and digging will not uproot and eliminate those "bad" weeds, but it just might make it obvious to others that we are trying to make a difference just like Jesus did when he helped the poor, when he prayed for those who were sick and homeless, and when he walked the walk by loving everyone... even those who were different than he. Weeds will be weeds! No matter how passionate we are to try to eliminate them by spreading love and acceptance, offering a willing hand, and praying for those we don't even know. But staying attentive to the weeds will help us look like God's people who truly care...even to those who don't.

Sometimes I wonder if we just might feel lost *to* the weeds. Most times however, I feel like we might feel lost *in* the weeds. Getting lost *in* the weeds means we're paying too much attention to unnecessary details and getting overwhelmed and bogged down and falling behind on what God placed us here to be, to do, and to become.

When we are bogged down *in* the weeds, not caring by what is happening in the weeds—maybe to the point of being overwhelmed by what is happening in our world around us, that's the perfect time to remember these words: "relax and return to your soul, for it has always been known as your home." Because whenever we're lost and overwhelmed, that's exactly when we need to care for our soul so we can open-up to those who need to see a true soul that cares.

So, with the grim reality of the persistence of weeds (our mission field), I encourage each of you to dig deep into your soul. It is there that you just might hear the beauty and promise of one of the parables in the Bible: Even though the weeds are left to grow until the harvest, they do not prevent the wheat from growing—it continues to grow and bear fruit. In fact, it is not until it begins to bear fruit that it becomes recognized as the good stuff. Our mission is to tend to the weeds but allow the wheat (you and me) to thrive.

We may be living with weeds, there may be those around us who need our help, but when we live inside our heart we will continue to grow, and we will bear fruit **AND** we will guide others on their way to their own giving heart.


